

SPORTSMEN, ANGLERS SUPPORT MERRIMAC PARK
Donations Key to Park Project in Town of Merrimac
For Release April 10, 2003

(MERRIMAC, WI) - Walleye North America has donated \$2,000 to the Town of Merrimac to purchase the Clingman property, an area local officials are attempting to preserve for park and conservation space on Lake Wisconsin. The donation means that the town has already exceeded 20% of its fundraising goal in just a few months.

Several sporting organizations have also made donations in recent weeks. Donations of \$500 each have been received from the Sauk County Sportsmen's Alliance, Roxbury Rod & Gun Club, Wisconsin River Sportsmen's Club, and the Spring Green Rod & Gun Club. Other donations include \$500 each from Richard & Nancy Grant and the Summer Oaks Condo Association of Merrimac. These donations are in addition to a \$10,000 donation received earlier from the Bart & Char Olson Foundation, as well as a few small private donations.

Town Chairman Richard Grant thanked all of the donors at the Town Board Meeting on Tuesday, April, 8, 2003. He stated the response from local hunters and anglers reflects the historical interests of these groups to conserve land and resources.

The township is seeking to purchase 8.5 acres of property currently owned by Evan Clingman of Pennsylvania. The property has been in the family for years and was last resided upon in 1938. The natural surroundings create one of the oldest growth forests on Lake Wisconsin as well as one of the largest undeveloped shorelines on the lake. It is anticipated that the DNR will get the property adjacent to the Clingman property when the United States Army transfers the Badger Army Ammunition Plant (BAAP) properties as the plant has been closed. The DNR has already completed the purchase of the 3.5 acre parcel next to the BAAP pump house property. The town is now working to provide funding for the 8.5 acres it intends to purchase. The town plans hopes acquire an additional 5 acres for the park when Hwy. 78 is relocated in 2007.

The town plans to submit for a Lake Protection Grant from the DNR which will cover up to 75% of the \$260,000 purchase price. The remaining monies will be raised through private donations. The town's goal to raise private money for the balance of the purchase would alleviate any need to raise tax revenues. This is an important part of the purchase considering the money needed for the purchase is currently about 40% of the town's current tax levy.

Unlike other major lakes in Wisconsin, such as Castle Rock or Petenwell lakes, Lake Wisconsin does not have a major park area on the lake. Presently, there is a DNR boat ramp at Moon Valley Resort and a Sauk County boat ramp next to Summer Oaks Resort, but neither facility allows people to enjoy a nature hike or provide major access to on-shore fishing access.

Once the land is acquired, the town plans to work out an arrangement with the DNR to manage the property. Some of the early vision for the park shows the town's portion mainly being used for hiking trails and nature observation points. There would also be areas that provide excellent off-shore fishing opportunities in Weigand's Bay. When the Hwy. 78 is abandoned, it is possible the abandoned stretchy along the bay could be utilized for handicapped fishing. The DNR also has a long range vision of providing day camping sites and possibly boat access on it's portion. Throughout the bay, the DNR has also budgeted for improving the fish habitat with off shore reefs and fish cribs. DNR officials are cautious about their future plans as these projects take funding and might not be able to happen for several years.

The initiative of purchasing land by the Town of Merrimac for conservation is unique in that these projects are generally seen at the county or state level. The township's effort to conserve this property might be one of the first for a local township. While other municipalities (such as cities

and villages) and counties often preserve park space it is rarely been seen at the township level. The DNR hopes the success of this project will encourage other townships to follow suit.

The town has authorized honoring those who make donations to this project by honoring them with a plaque or monument. Donations of \$500.00 or more will qualify for this recognition. Because the donation is being made to a government entity, as well as for park conservation, donations are tax-deductible. Donors are asked to consult with their tax professional to make certain their donation is in fact eligible.
